Semester One Round-Up from the Principal: Gary White

As you can well imagine, in an organisation as large as Lake Bolac P-12 College, we are heavily involved in the community and there are many people and events that contribute to the development and maintenance of the school's culture and the strengthening of our 'Learning Community' each term. For this reason this term has been no different.

The College held its annual ANZAC Day Service for our 'Learning Community' which was again a demonstration of team work, commitment and dedication along with being a fitting tribute to our service men and women. Like most of our formal occasions, this one was again a student centered affair, run by the students. Our year 9/10 students along with Mark Howard prepared a moving tribute to the men and women of the Australian Armed Forces, which was excellent; it was presented again the next day at the Lake Bolac RSL's ANZAC Day service. Both the school and the community services were well attended by many members of our school's 'Learning Community', something that we value greatly.

During the term were privileged to welcome a number of visitors into the College in the form of the Carranballac College Music Department Rock Band; students and staff from Maroona and Willaura Primary Schools; the illustrator of the Deltora Quest series of books; two beautiful Poddy Calves and a large number of the Lake Bolac community members, whom we value greatly. The students also experienced some wonderful opportunities that came our way in the form of a Soccer Clinic; AFL clinic with Melbourne players; a fundraising Fun Run; trips to Etihad for AFL Friday Night matches and the list goes on....

It is with a degree of sadness that we said farewell to Mr David Tyler as he left to take up a position as Assistant Principal at Rushworth P-12 College this term, commencing from the start of term three 2012. David has been a member of the Lake Bolac P-12 College team now for eight years and has filled the role of manager of the Senior School along with many other roles, for much of that time. David, at all times, fought the fight for the students and particularly for those who he saw as the underdog. He was also very much a supporter of his colleagues, working for harmonious outcomes at all times. As the manager of the Senior School, teacher of English and with all the other hats that he was required to wear on

















a daily basis, David will no doubt be Rushworth P-12 College's gain and be sorely missed by the Lake Bolac school community.

As has been the case for the past seven years I ventured down to Lorne for the annual three day Grampians Region Principal's Conference, hearing from a number of influential guest speakers about their perspectives on education, as it exists in today's world. This always serves to assist me in developing my vision for what education might look like in the future but more particularly at Lake Bolac in the context of our remote, rural, small school environment. I have always found that it assists me to become a better 'Instructional Leader' within our school; to lead by example when it comes to the development of school curriculum and to drive the school improvement agenda. It assists me to consolidate my school's programs with the view to improving not only our own school's outcomes, but those of the whole education system. As a side bonus I learnt that I dramatically under utilise my iPad2 and I learnt that there is a vast array of FREE applications that can be down loaded via the App Store which are extremely useful, functional and educational.

The College held its second very successful Transition Expo Open Day during the term with staff and students from Willaura and Maroona Primary Schools attending our school for a day long experience. They experienced Science the Andrew Twiss way; Cooking with Master Chef Kim Blackshaw and Woodwork as only John Wallis can do. All students went home with a Key Holder, a Dirt Cake (Google it if you want to know more, great fun) and many unanswered questions about Science, along with a show bag of goodies. The Lake Bolac & District Kindergarten and Playgroup kids, along with some mums, were also provided with an exciting sample of school life as they also joined us for the day. As Principal it is very rewarding to see staff, parents and students working together to promote the College in such a fantastic way. Small Schools are Great Schools and we have a great school!

Until this term the College had previously run separate Cross Country events for the Junior and Senior school students, so it was very pleasing when Margot Donaldson and Grace Bannon joined forces to run our first ever P-12 Cross Country day. Each age group was provided with a specially marked out course (according to their age group) to complete. It was a special event made even better by the fact that we had good weather, a great atmosphere and a large number of parents in attendance to cheer all the students off from the start line as they commenced their run.

This year the College has four wonderful new graduate teachers working with the students, this term saw some of us more experienced hands head down to Geelong to attend a mentor's day as part of a Supporting New Teachers program. It was very pleasing to have such a high representation of graduates and senior mentors present on the day. As Principal, the day helped me learn that I need to take baby steps and that having knowledge and experience on my side want to hurry the process of being new and requiring to learn from our own mistakes.





Of course this term saw us complete the usual Student Opinion Survey, NAPLAN Assessments and the undertaking of an exciting array of activities as part of Education Week. Education week consisted of a number of activities taking place across the whole College. We were able to welcome Liz from the Ballarat Courier 'Newspapers in Education' (NIE), we had a book fair operating and the traditional Footy Colours Day with students enjoying a pie and a donut. We had a former student show us that knowledge is power and with knowledge comes opportunity and great careers in the Mining Industry. As part of our LOTE program we held a Japanese day where students completed a range of activities; we held a book fair with many students purchasing books for home; we worked with our Poddy Calves as part of our 'Cows Create Careers' project. We all even stopped to read a book for the first twenty minutes of every day, coupled with the older students working along-side their younger counterparts to achieve many great things and finally on the Friday, I was privileged to travel with Mark Howard and a group of thirteen of our students to Etihad Stadium in Melbourne to watch an AFL match between the Dogs and the Cats where of course the cream rose to the top and the Cats won! We repeated the experience the following week with VCE students and I'm glad to say, the same outcome against Carlton.

Our first ever P-12 Fun Run was held to raise money for a school owned mini-bus with a community focus. It was most pleasing to see students, staff and parents in costumes not only supporting the Fun Run but the hard work of two of our younger graduate staff members in Margot Donaldson and Grace Bannon.

In other news for the term, the College has been nominated for a \$1,000,000 grant for the development of a Trade Training Centre with will hopefully deliver Vet Certificates in Automotive, Hospitality and Welding & Construction. Should the College be successful with this grant it will open up enormous opportunities for our students in terms of qualifications and employment opportunities. We took delivery of some more laptop computers during the term which will mean that we are very close to achieving a 1:1 ratio for student and computers.

We are seeking benefactors for our Community Bus concept for which the College is thinking that this vehicle will be seen as a 'Lake Bolac P-12 College Learning Community' asset. The 22 seater minibus will belong to the College's School Council but be available to **all** Lake Bolac community groups. The interest has been such shown currently in the form of expressions of interest in the use of the bus from groups like the Bush Nursing Hospital, the Elderly Citizens group, the Bowls Club and the Community Centre, with the list growing daily gives us encouragement for its purchase. It has served to enlighten me as to just how many community groups there are in Lake Bolac and just how diverse our 'Lake Bolac P-12 College Learning Community' actually is, with nearly all interest groups being covered.

We have also commenced to receive pledges of financial support prompting us to think that a near new 22 seater mini-bus may well be possible. Karen McIntyre and Jenny Holdsworth have offered to head up a fundraising committee. The College would welcome contact from any person in the community who would be in a position to donate a sum of money, large or small, towards the purchase of this community asset. As I am sure you can see, the benefits for the community are enormous along with the untold benefit to the students and the potential learning experiences that can be achieved.

The College has created a Facebook page to assist in creating greater community awareness in the College and to support our drive to increase school enrolments. Normally I would not be in favour of the use of Facebook but many businesses use Facebook as a way to promote their services and given that education is now a competitive market, we must all move with the times. So please locate us on Facebook and 'Like' us. The more 'Likes' that we receive, the more promotion we receive. We have also been working on up-grading our School's website to reflect our strong sense of community. I would again encourage you to check out the website, enjoy the changes that have been put in place and then provide us with some feedback and suggestions regarding even further improvements because you may have seen a website design that would further enhance our community profile.

Lastly our Junior and Senior musical productions are in the process of commencing their rehearsals so keep an eye on the school's newsletter for details for dates and time for the respective shows. Thank you to the many community members who contact the College during any given week, your support and encouragement is greatly valued and appreciated and we look forward to it continuing well into the future.

I believe that: "You only regret the things in life that you DON'T do." I always have a go and take opportunities as they come.


I am twenty four years old. I have grown up as part of a large family in Melbourne. I could be found on the beach with my friends in the summer. I love being active and outdoors.





It's almost 20 years ago that I was selecting subjects to enter VCE. During this time I had grand plans of becoming a doctor – a doctor / surgeon, who could do it all - like good ol' Terrence Elliott in "A Country Practice".

I remember VCE being a hard slog, but little did I know about what I was getting into!! With the support of Cate Lewis, Andrew Twiss, Colin Easton, Wendy Graham and Roger Flanner – I managed to get the scores needed to enter Medicine at Monash Uni.





FAMILY FAVOURITE RECIPE: Provided by Neroli Dunn

Egg & Bacon Pie

This is a meal my Mam would make to use the duck eggs we had on the farm and now it is shared in my own family and has become a crowd favourite. I would use duck eggs in this (when we had ducks) but now I just use chook eggs.



INGREDIENTS:

- 2 sheets of frozen puff pastry thawed
- 4 Potatoes peeled and sliced thinly
- 4 rashers of bacon chopped
- 2 onions thinly sliced

Couple of sprigs of fresh parsley

Paprika

10 Eggs or 6 duck eggs- lightly whisked

Salt and Pepper

METHOD:

Preheat Oven to 200C.

Fry bacon and onion in a little oil until onion is soft and bacon browned.

Using Spray oil lightly cover a Lasagne dish or baking dish and then line it with the pastry sheets, cutting it to fit up the sides as well.

Place a layer of potato on the bottom of the pastry dish and then a third of the cooked onion and bacon. Repeat these layers until your final layer is bacon and onion.

Add salt and pepper to taste to the egg mixture and add 2-3 tablespoons of water then pour mixture over the layers. Grab a pastry brush and dip into the egg and paint it around the edge of the pastry or use your finger!

Sprinkle paprika over the top and place in the oven to cook for approximately 1 hour.

Serve with a tossed salad and crunchie bread.

You can adjust this recipe to make a larger one quite easily.

Great served cold. Not suitable to freeze.

Serves 6
